<u>Summary of Visit</u> — A thorough inspection of the HOA's common grounds (streets and amenity areas throughout Palmira) took place for the removal of the invasive Cane toads. There was an estimated count of 250 Cane toads removed throughout this month. The areas reported from Management and/or Owners have been checked well and we will keep on our radar for future visits. We highly recommend that Owners keep lights off at night, or switch to bug lightbulbs. This will help keep the Cane toads from hanging out close to homes, under lights. The warmer weather is here, which makes the Cane toads much more active. The rain will make them more active within the streets and yards, because they do not need the lake for their water source.

**Native Southern Toads are present in this community as well, not all are Cane Toads. Invoice attached. Picture below shows some of the catch for this month.

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

Identifying a Cane Toad

Remove the invasive species

One of the easiest ways to tell the Cane toad and Native toad apart is by looking on top of their head. The Southern toad, native to Florida, has a crest on top of their head. Think of the crest as a crown, and they should be treated as royalty. The toads with the crown can be left alone. The invasive Cane toad has a smooth head. They do not have the crest like the Southern toads.
